We seek out partnerships with community and faith-based providers to develop and implement meaningful programs and transitional services to promote offenders' reentry into the community.




GENERAL INFORMATION

The Orange County Corrections Department offers a variety of educational, religious and rehabilitative programs to adult and juvenile inmates. This booklet provides a list of classes and services offered at OCCD.

- Inmates eligible and interested in a program may submit an Inmate Request Form in order to register for a specific class or program.
- Dependent upon the housing location, classification, and disciplinary status, inmates may or may not be eligible to participate in a program.
- Classes are subject to change due to operational issues and demand.
- Certificates are awarded upon completion and may be used in court to show active program involvement while in custody.
- Regular attendance is required.
- The court has the option of sentencing inmates to programs offered by the Orange County Corrections Department.







PROGRAMS ASSESSMENT

Orientation: During the orientation, male and female inmates are informed about all programs and services offered at Orange County Corrections. Inmates are able to make program requests while they are in the Booking and Release Center or once they arrive in their permanent housing location. Additionally, information on voting, voter registration, and absentee ballots are made available to the inmates.

<u>Assessment:</u> The goal of the assessment and orientation process is to determine the programmatic needs of the inmate while incarcerated at Orange County Corrections. Eligible inmates are given the Michigan Alcohol Screening Test (MAST), the Drug Assessment Screening Test (DAST) and the PROXY risk assessment to determine their possible risk of re-offending. Inmates are consequently moved by the Classification Unit according to their program requests and/or program recommendations and placed into different programs.

EDUCATIONAL SERVICES

The mission of Educational Services is to assist incarcerated male and female inmates (adults and juveniles) in achieving the highest academic standards consistent with Orange County Public School Board.

<u>**GED:**</u> Participants considered test-ready receive classroom instructions on the essentials of passing the high school exam via computerized tests.

<u>Adult Literacy Program:</u> Participants with a reading score below 6 are eligible to enroll in this program provided by community volunteers. Classes consist of reading curricula focused on basic reading levels 1 through 4.



Inmate Library: Provides a variety of reading

materials from Monday to Friday to all inmates of the Orange County Jail.

DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMS

Chemical Dependency

<u>New Beginnings Program:</u> Intensive drug education for female inmates addressing their substance abuse, alcohol addiction and criminal thinking errors.

<u>CHOICES Program</u>: Intensive drug education program for male inmates with emphasis on continuum of care, relapse prevention, life skills, critical thinking, anger management, HIV education, Alcoholics and Narcotics Anonymous.

<u>Residential Substance Abuse Treatment (RSAT)</u>: Affords male inmates the opportunity to participate in intensive drug treatment groups and individual sessions, develop a sobriety maintenance plan and participate in a continuum of care program upon release.

<u>Alcoholics Anonymous:</u> Classes are facilitated by an AA volunteer who provides information and alternatives to dealing with alcohol addiction. Individuals share testimonies and their life experiences.

<u>Narcotics Anonymous:</u> Classes are facilitated by a NA volunteer who provides information and alternatives in dealing with drug addiction. Individuals share testimonies and their life experiences.



DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMS

Veterans/Restorative Justice Programs

<u>Veterans Program</u>: Provides services to inmates who have served in the Armed Forces to create a seamless transition from the jail to the community. Inmates participate in Life Skills, Victim Impact classes, in addition to being provided with individual case management by Orange County Corrections Programs staff and the Department of Veterans Affairs.

<u>Victim Impact Class</u>: This 8-week program is geared toward assisting inmates to become more aware of the impact that crime has on victims, and to take responsibility for their negative actions and begin to make amends. The curriculum focuses on victims and their rights as a central premise. Victims of different crimes are invited as guest speakers to tell their story.

DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMS

Self-Help Programs

<u>HIV/AIDS Awareness</u>: A program provided to the inmates to learn about sexually transmitted diseases, prevention strategies, and treatment options. HIV/AIDS testing is offered to the inmates in every housing facility.

<u>Anger Management Class:</u> Provides inmates with a series of six classes addressing anger, low self-worth, coping skills and thinking errors.

<u>Life Skills Class</u>: This class curriculum focuses on decision making skills, goal setting, financial responsibility, motivational techniques, communication skills, interpersonal relationships, and cognitive behavior restructuring groups.



<u>**Parenting Program:**</u> This class teaches inmates positive parenting skills and informs about the negative effects of child abuse and neglect.

<u>Sexual Trauma Program</u>: An evidence-based psycho-educational program that provides orientation, assessment, individual and group counseling provided by the Orange County Victim Service Center for female victims of sexual abuse.

<u>Cognitive Behavioral Change Program</u>: This program provides an evidencebased 10-session curriculum for male and female inmates focusing on cognitive behavior restructuring addressing criminal thinking errors.

<u>RESTORE</u>: An evidence-based program that focuses on inmates' criminogenic needs through cognitive behavior intervention and open forum groups to identify needs upon transitioning into the community. The program is geared toward low custody inmates who are going to be released into the community in the near future.

<u>New Start Program</u>: The New Start Program is operated by qualified Orange County Corrections Programs staff to provide Moral Recognition Therapy (MRT) curriculum and art enrichment activities to inmates cleared from subacute housing. OCCD medical staff work in collaboration with OCCD Programs staff to ensure medication compliance and address the mental health needs of each participant.

DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMS Case Management Services


ID Services: In partnership with the Florida Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV), Orange County Corrections provides Real ID compliant program participants with a replacement ID or driver's license. The DMV mobile Florida Licensing on Wheels van provides services to inmates and staff members once per quarter.

Pre-Release Orientation: Programs staff facilitates orientation classes for inmates with 45-60 days prior to their release date to provide them with community-based referrals. Guest speakers from various community agencies are invited to provide inmates with their contact information.

Individual Case Management: Case Managers provide intensive individual case management for sentenced and pre-sentenced inmates assisting them with housing, shelter, placement into in-patient drug rehabilitation, mental health counseling referrals and transitional services. A comprehensive resource guide to community based organizations is provided so they may continue services after release. This network of support creates a pathway for successful reintegration into society.

Low Income Non-Custodial Outreach Service (L.I.N.O.S.): This cooperative effort between Orange County Corrections Inmate Programs Unit and the Florida Department of Revenue Child Support Program assists incarcerated individuals in becoming compliant with their child support obligations.





FAITH-BASED PROGRAMS

The Orange County Corrections Department is committed to providing a wide variety of religious and faith-based programs to meet the spiritual needs of the inmate population. The variety of programming also supports their faith-based education and transition to the community.

Additional Faith-Based Programming

Discover Your Potential: Provides male and female inmates the opportunity to participate in a 6-week class curriculum that utilizes open discussion to evaluate life situations and choose ethical solutions.

Inside Out: Good News Global provides a 4-5 week Christian-based reentry program assisting male and female inmates with a smooth transition back into society.

Life Learning: The faith-based Life Learning class consists of self-awareness, spiritual well-being, employability, financial management, family life and restorations.

VOCATIONAL PROGRAMS

<u>Construction Program:</u> In this 6-week program taught by Valencia College, students learn a variety of basic construction skills that are required for many entry level positions in the field of building construction. Successful graduates receive a NCCER Core Construction certificate, Maintenance of Traffic certificate, OSHA 10, First Aid



and CPR certifications. Graduates are also eligible for three college credits toward an Associate in Science Degree in Building Construction Technology.

<u>Culinary Arts Training</u>: This 4-week course at the Phoenix Facility prepares participants for employment in the food service industry. The class combines practical work in the kitchen with classroom instruction. Graduating students receive the ServSafe Florida Food Handler Certification.





REENTRY AND TRANSITIONAL SERVICES

Reentry and Transitional Services works with inmates and offenders transitioning into society by addressing specific criminogenic needs to include housing, employment, food, health benefits, vocational and educational options to assist them in navigating through society successfully.

Job Readiness Program: Evidence-based program that focuses on preparing offenders to enter into the workforce. In this 2-week program, offenders meet once per week for 6.5 hrs per session. The program is designed to assist offenders with exploring career possibilities and the tools used to maintain employment.

Drop-In Center: Provides an on-site clothing closet and a computer lab. The computer lab is available for anyone who needs assistance preparing a resume and searching for employment. Clothes can be obtained for those seeking employment or everyday wear.
